May the education given in Jamaica today help our boys and girls, men and women to live the abundant life, which is the greatest of aims, also to understand one another's view point to let us make greater efforts to have more confidence in one another and in ourselves, to Fear God, Love the Brotherhood and Honour the King.

We have much to learn, and a long way to go, but when we grow tired or faint-hearted we go and look at the simple inscription in imagination on the corner-stone of some fine building and read its message: "For God and the Children."

"Let no man think that sudden in a minute,

All is accomplished and the work is done;

Though with thy earliest dawn Thou should'st begin it,

Scarce it were ended in thy setting sun."

MO. BAY YACHT CLUB LAUNCH FINE BOAT

Mr. A. R. Magnus's Speedy Snipe 'Zip' Given Hearty Send off On Maiden Cruise

MONTEGO BAY, Feb. 7.—The first launching of a yacht from the club house of the recently formed Montego Bay Yacht Club was most successfully carried out on Sunday morning.

The new boat is the "Zip", a trim little craft of the "snipe" class, built and owned by Mr. Alan Magnus, one of the foundation members of the club. The "Zip" shows evidence of considerable speed, and is expected to acquit herself well during the forthcoming Regatta to be held at Montego Bay on March 4, 5 and 6.

The launching was an auspicious and popular occasion, and attended by many members of the club and their friends.

There was considerable credit, thought Mr. Fletcher, due to one who did this, and who put into the building of it all the love and care and affection that Mr. Magnus had done.

They were met that morning, he continued, to wish this boat success and its owner many happy hours with her.

Mr. Magnus wished to tell them something about his boat, and the motives that prompted him to build her, and so, in conclusion, he would repeat that they were met for the express purpose of seeing the "Zip" on her way for the first time, and to do honour to the man who had built her for himself.

Mr. Magnus rose to speak. "I am not much of a speaker," he began, "but first of all I wish to welcome you all here. I welcome you not only to this occasion of the launching of the boat, but I wish to welcome you also to this yacht club—because the yacht club is very dear to my heart."

He said that he knew that many of those present had not visited this yacht club before, and so on behalf of the club and its officers he wished to welcome them most cordially.

The club, he thought, was filling a long-felt want in this community. When he had first come to Montego Bay, he had wondered why, with so wonderful a harbour as they had there, there was not more active interest taken in yachting. Then it was gradually mooted among several people that a yacht club had been spoken of; a few of them got together and sent out circulars—and this club was the result.

He might further tell them that he considered himself one of the foundation members of this yacht club (hear, hear), and when the club was formed, which had been very shortly after the last sailing regatta that they had in Montego Bay, he had made up his mind that the only way

and enthusiasm in a yacht club here was to have a fleet of boats—because a yacht club without boats and without sailing was, after all, no yacht club at all. On that occasion, therefore, he had made a vow that, although he was not much of a yachtsman himself, he would pick up a little yachting and build a boat for himself, for

the purpose of taking part in the Regatta and enhancing the welfare of this club.

He hoped that this boat would be the forerunner of many, many more "snipes." In fact, they were looking forward to having a really big fleet of "snipes"—because they were extensively sailed in all parts of the world, because there was no more suitable type of boat for Montego Bay, and because they so suited the pockets of people like himself.

LAUNCHING OF "ZIP"

Mr. Magnus, concluding amid great applause, jumped down into the club's slip way and, assisted by Mr. Robert Fletcher and Mr. Leslie Fletcher, pushed the "Zip" into the water.

At the same time, Mrs. Magnus duly christened the boat "Zip."

In a short time the "Zip's" sails were spread, and with Mr. Magnus, Mr. Leslie Fletcher, and Mr. Robert Fletcher aboard her, sailed briskly across the harbour. Even in the few minutes she was out, she showed a very handy turn of speed in the light breeze, and excellent manoeuvrability as she darted among the anchored craft.

As soon as she was in the water and away, her "health" was ably proposed by Mr. Walter Fletcher, commodore of the Montego Bay Yacht Club. This, remarked Mr. Fletcher, was a most auspicious occasion, since it marked the

of any boat from this yacht club. They hoped that it was the forerunner of many more launchings as time went by.
